





Have you ever set out on an adventure feeling fully prepared, only to realize you completely missed something important? Maybe you forgot your phone charger on a road trip, or worse—your coffee on an early morning commute. (The horror!) Well, welcome to Joshua 7-9, where Israel is stepping into victory... only to trip over hidden sin, deception, and the consequences of not seeking God's wisdom first.

We've come so far already—watching God part the Jordan, conquer Jericho, and remind His people that He fights for them. It's been awe-inspiring, hasn't it? But now, as we move forward, things get messy. Instead of unwavering faith, we see failure. Instead of clear victories, we find deception, consequences, and unexpected twists in the story. And yet, through it all, we see the unshakable faithfulness of God.

Joshua 7 opens with a hard truth—disobedience has real consequences. Achan's hidden sin leads to Israel's devastating defeat at Ai, reminding us that what's hidden in our hearts matters to God. But we also see the beauty of restoration when sin is dealt with and obedience is restored.

By Joshua 8, Israel is back on track, following God's lead and walking in victory. We also witness a powerful moment of worship on Mount Ebal, where God's law is read, and His covenant is reaffirmed—a sacred reset after failure. And then, Joshua 9... where we meet the cunning Gibeonites. They don't fight. They don't run. They deceive. And somehow, by the end of the chapter, instead of being wiped out, they end up serving in the house of God.

These chapters are filled with weighty lessons—about obedience, about seeking God's wisdom, about living with the consequences of our choices, and about God's ability to work even in our failures. There's tension, challenge, and grace woven into these stories. And through it all, we are reminded that God's sovereignty reigns supreme. Even when people fail, He does not.

So, as we step into these next lessons, I invite you to bring your whole heart to this study. Let's ask the tough questions. Let's wrestle with the realities of sin, grace, and wisdom. And let's keep our eyes open for the incredible ways God's redemptive plan is unfolding—even in the unexpected.



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

Lesson Four/Day Ten - Create & Share

Throughout Joshua 7-9, we have seen how choices—whether made in obedience, fear, deception, or presumption—shape the course of events. Israel suffered defeat at Ai because of hidden sin. They later achieved victory through obedience. The Gibeonites avoided destruction but became servants. In each case, decisions led to consequences that revealed God's justice, mercy, and sovereignty.

Your Challenge:

Create a hands-on or visual representation of the choices made in Joshua 7-9 and their outcomes. Reflect on how obedience, deception, fear, and faith all played a role in this passage.

Consider:

- A Decision Pathway: Create a flowchart, board game, or interactive pathway that maps out key decisions in these chapters, showing where they led.
- **Symbolic Artwork:** Use colors, objects, or images to contrast choices that led to blessing versus those that led to consequences.
- Physical Representation: Build or arrange stones to represent significant moments (e.g., the altar on Mount Ebal, the deception of the Gibeonites, or the place of Israel's renewed obedience).
- **Journal Entry:** Write about how God's grace repurposes your past mistakes for His greater good.
